

Gender Violence and HIV&AIDS in South Africa

Research indicates that:

Women who have been physically & sexually assaulted by their partners

AND

Women in relationships with men that have a greater degree of control over them

are at higher risk of HIV infection

HIV&AIDS Prevalence in South Africa

According to StatsSA, the HIV&AIDS prevalence statistics in South Africa for 2010 are as follows:

- The total number of people living with HIV is estimated at approximately 5.24 million
- In 2010, approximately 1.6 million people aged 15 and older; and 183 000 children were in need of ARVs
- The total number of new HIV infections for 2010 is estimated at 410 000
- Of these, an estimated 40 000 will be among children

According to Redribbon:

- In 2008 there were **1356** new infections **every day**
- and 1063 deaths
- By June 2008, 2.5 million people had died of AIDS in South Africa
- South Africa has one of the highest infection rates globally
- It is believed that in 2009, an estimated 310 000 South Africans died of AIDS
- Almost one-in-three women aged 25-29, and over a quarter of men aged 30-34, are living with HIV

Gender Violence and HIV&AIDS

- A study from South Africa revealed that young women are much more likely to be infected than men, with women accounting for 77% of infections among youth aged between 15-24 years
- A study by Interpol, the international police agency, has revealed that South Africa leads the world in rapes
 - One in three of the 4,000 women questioned by the Community of Information, Em powerment and Transparency said they had been raped in the past year
 - Approximately 1300 women can be expected to be raped every day in South Africa

- More than four-in-ten South African men reported to have been physically violent to an intimate partner
- Over a quarter of men reported ever having raped a woman with nearly one-in-twenty committing rape in the previous year
- Of South African men who knew somebody who had been raped, 16% believed that the rape survivor had enjoyed the experience and had asked for it
- According to a recent study police estimated that only one in 36 rape cases were reported and of those only 15% culminated in a conviction





HIV&AIDS and Children

In 2009, The South African Institute of Race Relations (SAIRR) reported that:

- 32% of all children in the nation will have lost one or both parents to AIDS by 2015
- in 2007, 2.5 million children had lost one or both parents, and AIDS was the cause of more than half these deaths
- "Vulnerable children need additional support that is not necessarily monetary in nature, as these children have lost their primary caregiver," said Gail Eddy of SAIRR
- Other research finds that South Africa has some of the highest incidences of child and baby rape in the world with more than 67,000 cases of rape and sexual assaults against children reported in 2000
- Welfare groups believe the number of unreported incidents could be up to 10 times that number

HIV&AIDS Awareness

- Despite the improved reach of awareness campaigns, accurate knowledge about HIV&AIDS is poor
- Of particular worry is the lack of knowledge regarding how to prevent sexual transmission of HIV
- Across all age groups and sexes less than half of all people surveyed knew of both the preventive effect of condoms and that having fewer sexual partners could reduce the risk of becoming infected
- More troubling still is the fact that accurate knowledge has significantly decreased in recent years
- HIV & Sex education exists in schools as part of the Life Orientation curriculum which was implemented in

- 2002 and also covers subjects such as nutrition and careers guidance
- However, the shortage of trained teachers may result in just one teacher in a school (if that), being able to accurately and effectively teach HIV&AIDS education
- According to a comparative risk assessment for South Africa, unsafe sex ranks as the number one risk factor associated with the loss of potential years of life
